PCRIC Formalizes MOU with the Centre for Disaster Protection

Cook Islands, 4 March 2022: Pacific Catastrophe Risk Insurance Company (PCRIC) and the Centre for Disaster Protection have signed an MoU to establish a framework of collaboration in matters of common interest in disaster risk management and financing. The MoU provides a platform for collaboration in areas such as Technical Assistance and Capacity Building, Advocacy, and Research and Evidence.
